From the Pastor's Desk

Lent, In the Plural

In our culture almost everything gets boiled down to I, me, mine. We live in a place and time where we think and approach and live in a very individualistic way. Most matters (pleasure, career, money, politics, etc.) are viewed in terms where the individual, the lone person, is primary.

Religion is no different. Salvation becomes a matter of me and Jesus. Prayer is primarily thought of as me praying to God. "I" do good works, "I" follow Jesus, "I" am a Christian, mostly in ways which are solo, private, personal.

The Scriptures by and large think in a different way. There, the "people of God" are primary. God chose an entire nation to be his. The story of the Old Testament is the story of an entire group which God dealt with and provided for and guided. The New Testament as well. Jesus came to be the cornerstone for a building built of individual stones but joined as one temple, one building. The church is the body of Christ and individual members of it cannot live without being connected to the whole.

It is now the season of Lent. I want to encourage you to approach Lent in a way which is less individualistic, less all about you alone as a Christian. Less singular and more plural. A Lenten season as a congregation. During Lent we focus on Christ who gave himself us to make a holy people, who gathers us into his church as a body, where together we know his salvation and together live out his call.

Lent in the plural means focusing on being together in midweek and Sunday services. Lent in the plural means praying together as families and as a church. Lent in the plural means praying for those in our congregation, in our families and in our communities. Lent in the plural means being willing to forgive and to admit sins and mistakes, and being willing to say, "I don't have all the answers." Lent in the plural means sacrificing and sharing for those who are connected to you and those who are around you. Giving up something for Lent should mean the extra you now have you share. Maybe someone in the congregation is hurting, maybe someone in your neighborhood has a need or a difficulty you can help with, maybe a church member needs a visit or phone call.

During these next few weeks let us travel <u>_together_</u> to the cross and to the joyful celebration of the Resurrection.

This room is used for Music, STEM, Aftercare, Small Group Student Sessions, 1:1 Student Sessions, Bible Study, and English as a Second Language (ESL) classes. "New" Teacher (2023/2024) and NEW Afterschool Program Offerings

Our current part-time music teacher, Ms. Turmel, completed her master's degree in Music Education this past summer. Congratulations! And job well done! Ms. Turmel will join our team full-time in the 2023/2024 school year. Ms. Turmel will continue to lead our music program and support our resource teacher. Additional responsibilities will include establishing the Catonsville Youth Music Conservatory (CYMC), Director of Afterschool Enrichment programs, and substitute teaching. The CYMC will offer after-school music lessons (vocal and instrumental) and hold student recitals throughout the year. Afterschool enrichment programs under consideration are chess, reading, and Lego/robotics clubs. These clubs will be held in addition to and separate from aftercare.

From the Asset Management Board

As everyone has noticed, costs have risen a great deal and continue to do so. This also affects the church expenses, especially our energy costs. Energy costs for commercial establishments are even higher than for residences, so please make sure lights and fans, etc. are turned off when you leave.

In an effort to help reduce our energy costs, the church has signed up with Neighborhood Solar as our electric supplier. The church has a share in a solar farm and this earns us credits on our BGE bill. This will give us approximately a 5% reduction in the electric portion of our bill.

Plans are underway at this time to move forward with the renovation of the storage room in the lower level. As was passed by the voters last June, we will be turning the storage room into a classroom for the ECC. At this time we are finishing plans for permit and will soon be getting bids from contractors. The work should be done later this year.

Spring is fast approaching and that means that it is time to start thinking about the flower beds around the church. What Do Your Offerings Do?

St. Paul Lutheran School

The generosity of talents (monies) that members of St. Paul provide each week makes it possible to continue its calling and mission of over 65 years of delivering Christ-centered care and learning to families within our local community. The building, maintenance of the property, insurance and utilities are paid for in total by the congregation. The congregation also funds the operations manager and bookkeeper positions critical to our daily and fiscal operations. The cost of this support averages to be \$1400 per student. St. Paul is a Nationally Accredited Lutheran School and a Maryland Credentialed Childcare center. The generous financial support for the school ministry provides an affordable and high-quality care and educational option for preschool and elementary-age children within our local community.

However, most importantly, the dedicated staff of St. Paul provides the care and teaching of children in the context of a Biblical-based Christian worldview. Our total student population for the 2022/2023 school year is 146. This equates to sharing the Christian worldview and Gospel with over 400 persons (parents, siblings, grandparents, and other family members) in our community on a daily basis. Over 95% of our students are not members of St. Paul and approximately 70% of our school families indicated they are NOT connected with a community faith.

God provides for in amazing ways for the St. Paul school ministry on a daily basis. We look forward to seeing the amazing things He has planned for the future through your continuing dedication and support. We ask that you keep this ministry in your prayers on a regular basis.

Cemetery Committee Report

Yes, St Paul Lutheran Church has a cemetery. Is it possible that some of you did not know that? It is located at 1022 Joh Ave, about six miles from our church. The area is known as Violetville and the city line goes through our property. We have owned it since 1882.

The cemetery is approximately 80% filled and about 1,500 people are interred there. The Cemetery Committee manages sales as well as the upkeep of the property. The price of a plot for Church Members (and all Lutherans) is \$500. This is certainly the least expensive cemetery in the Baltimore area. The price includes perpetual care of the grounds.

Admittedly, the purchase of cemetery property is not the highest priority for most people. However, it should be. We plan for our retirement, but we often do not plan for our eventual demise, even though this is a certainty. I encourage you to tour the grounds and make a purchase. Consider also, the cost of funerals. These are much higher than cemetery costs and plan for these as well. I am ready to educate and assist you in this vital area.
