From the Pastor's Desk

In Praise of Maundy Thursday

When it comes to Holy Week, Good Friday is the big attraction. And well it should be. Jesus dies on the cross for our salvation. The whole world is rescued from sin and death by his blood. The Son of God, God himself, dies in human flesh. The cosmos shudders and recoils in horror even while the church calls it "Good".

But let me put in a good word for the night before. Thursday. It is a service that can get overlooked.

When one is parceling out one's church attendance budget (how much time do I have to spend in church) Easter Sunday is a must and Good Friday tends to hog the rest of the time. But I suggest that Maundy Thursday is well worth your attention. Here Christ gives a precious gift and what the cross means and how Christ's suffering comes to us and the victory and joy that results becomes perfectly and personally and tangibly clear. Together we receive the very body and blood of Christ.

Here is a short description of the Maundy Thursday service. Hope to see you there.

The service is in four parts:

- 1. **The Service of Reconciliation** marks the end of Lent. On Ash Wednesday we confessed our sin in a special way and tonight we are absolved, forgiven. We share the peace with one another (shaking hands) indicating that we seek to forgive as God has forgiven us.
- 2. **The Service of the Word** where we hear of the Thursday before his crucifixion when our Lord gave the gift of his body and blood to us for the forgiveness of our sins.
- 3. **The Service of the Lord's Supper** where we go to the table of the Lord where he gives us to eat of his suffering and the fruits of the Cross.
- 4. **The Stripping of the Altar.** The altar represents Christ and is laid bare, made desolate. The service ends with the suffering and agony of Christ on the cross and leads us into Good Friday.

From the Congregational President

March is here and that means spring...but it's cold...but it's hot...the temperatures are making me confused! We lost an hour of sleep already, and we need to prep for allergy season. There is a lot going on at church as well.

I wanted to take a moment and thank the members of the congregation who jumped into action when we had a couple of incidents during service over the past month. It shows how much we love and look out for each other. We know that the temperature variations outdoors and the less than nimble heating and cooling system indoors can make things a bit hotter than we care for. To try and mitigate this, we have lowered the temperature on the thermostat and are running the system fan during service. Additionally, we are opening the windows prior to service to get some fresh air into the sanctuary. Once again, thank you to everyone who has helped out.

If there happens to be any future incidents, everyone should also know that St. Paul has an AED device kept in a red carrying case on top of the coat rack across from the women's lavatory. The device talks the user through its use and does not require CPR training in order to use it. We have passed this information along with videos on how to use the device (here and here and the usher team and the elders. It is also good to know in case you are at church and there aren't ushers or elders around.

Now let's discuss the budget. You have seen the dates before and here are the remaining dates for this year:

- April 18th REVISION budgets due
- May 16th FINAL budget for voters in June
- May 21st Reports and budget available to voters to review
- June 4th Voters Meeting after church in fellowship hall

That's some of where we are going, but what have we been doing? Well, if you remember, we passed a large deficit budget last year. I'm pleased to say that we are doing better than we had expected, and instead of a budgeted \$94K deficit, we are currently at \$74K, and very likely at a \$54K deficit by the end of the year. This is better than planned, but still a deficit. The school has made wonderful improvements in its faculty, curriculum, and technology and is meeting the goals we set for this year. Enrollment is good, the income isn't quite there yet, but we are trending in the right direction. The investment in the school is needed and over the next 2 years we will continually reassess our plan. Running at a deficit is not sustainable, but it's something we need to do in the short term to reach our goal of a sustainable school mission. Over the next couple of months we will provide more detail on these numbers and goals, but I want everyone to know that we are accomplishing what we set out to do.

We also want to provide a high-level update on where we are at with our surplus funds. We had about \$308K in surplus at the end of last year. If we take out the principal payment on the mortgage of \$26K, that puts us at \$282K left. We passed a \$94K deficit, which put us at \$188K, however, as mentioned above, that could be down to \$54K which means we have \$228K left.

We also approved money to be spent on remodeling the storage room, media center, a new sound system, and a site review, totaling \$148K. That would leave us around \$80K of surplus funds going into this next year. That number will likely be a bit higher considering what was spent on the remodeling efforts and sound system. Details on what was spent on these efforts, with more exact numbers, will be available in the future.

The church council is working hard on the next budget and we look forward to presenting that to you in May and June. We will also be looking to vote on the following positions:

- Council President
- Council Vice President
- Council Secretary
- Asset Management Board
- Mission Board
- School Board

If you are interested in running for any of these positions, or you have questions about them, let myself or the board chair know.

As always, if you have any questions, comments, or concerns you would like to see addressed, please let us know. Our next church council meeting is April 18th, 2023 at 7pm.
