### Representation at 68<sup>th</sup> Regular Convention-Milwaukee, WI

Our treasurer, Paul Lubell, will be representing Circuit 5 churches, including St Paul, at the 68th Regular Convention of The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod (LCMS) to be held July 29th through August 3rd in Milwaukee, WI (beer country). The other churches in Circuit 5, Southeastern District are Christ the King (Owings Mills), Crosswalk (Columbia), Emmanuel (Catonsville), Faith (Eldersburg), Holy Nativity (Arbutus), and Pilgrim (Gwynn Oak). Paul has also been selected to be on Floor Committee 13, Registration, Credentials, and Elections. He is one of only four people from the Southeastern District who have been appointed to a floor committee and is honored to have been chosen. He is a voting Layperson and will help select all the leaders of the LCMS including leaders at the District level. This will be a very busy time for Paul as everyday will start with breakfast at 6:15 am with the other members from our district. Much of the time at the Convention will be used to prayerfully consider the Resolutions that will be presented to the assembly and, if adopted, will guide the administration of the LCMS during the next three years. We are thankful for Paul's service and pray that he is guided by the Holy Spirit while serving us at the Convention.

### St. Paul ECC and Elementary Programs

#### Growing and Expanding, Praise God and Thank you!

<u>Early Childhood Center</u>: The ECC is near capacity for the 2023/2024 school year. This past year, we added an enrichment program that includes music, art, and dance. Pastor holds weekly chapels designed specifically for the younger children.

Congratulations to the ECC staff who completed the qualifications to receive a State of Maryland Excels Quality Rating 1. We will continue to work over the summer to achieve a Level 3 rating. The Maryland EXCELS program is an optional program that identifies programs that exceed state licensing requirements and are committed to continuous quality improvement and providing quality care for children. This program is a metric of excellence some families look for and helps St. Paul on its continuing path to excellence in early childhood care and education.

<u>Elementary Program Enrollment:</u> From 2009-2019 the average elementary enrollment was 49 students. Since 2019 our average enrollment has been 72 students; as of this month, we have 73 enrolled students for the 2023/2024 school year. God continues to provide daily and richly for our ministries at St. Paul.

<u>Program Offerings Expansion</u>: This year we refreshed our English and Mathematics curriculum. We are also in the process of refreshing our library collection and implementing an online card catalog. Next year we will update our Social Studies curriculum, expand our Music offerings, afterschool programs (e.g. chess, robotics, reading), and add a 2024 Summer Camp.

<u>Facilities:</u> Enclosing the Learning Center created an improved environment for our Music, Library, Digital Citizenship, STEM, and afterschool Enrichment offerings. It also was very useful to have staff meet with small groups of students who needed additional help in reading or math.

This year we added a GaGa Pit and 9 Square Game to provide additional options for the students to play group games together during recess. Also, our PE teacher did a fundraiser for the American Heart Association that (again) provided for the purchase of new PE equipment.

We received a grant to add central air conditioning to several areas of the facility currently served by noisy window air conditioners. We look forward to that happening this summer to be ready for school starting in the Fall!

Thank you again for your unwavering support of the education ministry at St. Paul.

#### New Hymn for the Summer

#### We Praise You and Acknowledge You, O God (LSB 941)

We will sing a hymn new to St. Paul a few times this summer. This is a "new" hymn that is actually an "old" hymn. It is a versification of the Te Deum, a Latin hymn which is one of the oldest in Western Christianity. Many Lutherans will be familiar with the setting of the Te Deum from the TLH and LW Matins service where it was sung immediately after the sermon.



The Te Deum was written in the 300's AD by an unknown author. It has been in continuous use since then and Luther considered it on par with the Apostles Creed as a statement of faith. The Te Deum has three sections: the first praising God in his heavenly glory, the second outlining the saving accomplishments of Christ in His incarnation and the third a prayer that the Holy Spirit would assist us, who have been bought with the price of His blood, and bring us to everlasting glory.

This versification in LSB 941 was written by Stephen Starke, a current LCMS pastor who has written many hymns. The hymn tune (THAXTED) is a portion of a symphonic work by Gustav Holst called The Planets. It is the fourth movement: Jupiter. I think you will find the tune to be a strong, majestic and inspiring match to the words of the Te Deum. You may listen to the hymn <u>on YouTube, here.</u> Let us sing and rejoice! -- Pastor Alms
