News From the Flders

These are the elders for 2023; contact any of us with personal concerns via email, phone, or in person: Kevin Dungey (Chairman), Jim Baeder, Norm Giguere, Roy Krakat, Bill Oldhouser, Jeff Piegols, and Bruce Staudinger.

The following words head our agenda at each meeting and serve to guide what we elders do in serving St. Paul: Jesus calls us to be a Lutheran community gathered around Word and Sacrament and sends us to reach the lost, disciple the saved, and care for our neighbors everywhere. With the Pastor, using Word and Sacrament ministry, we assist members to mature as disciples of Jesus.

You are very familiar with seeing two elders assisting Pastor with communion at each communion service, one elder communing Pastor, and both assisting by serving wine from the common cup or individual cups.

You can also see that we are charged with helping Pastor create a Lutheran community, which means a community that is built around our common understanding of the Word of God as expressed in the Bible (for example, that we are saved by Jesus' death on the cross and God's love for each of us and not by any works of ours) and a community in which members care for each other.

As an aspect of this caring for our faith community, each elder has a "flock," a group of St. Paul members they specifically keep in touch with. Elders track attendance through Breeze to try and spot any flock member's unexplained absence from worship. We also work to be aware of any need for prayer so that we may refer this need to the St. Paul Prayer Chain. The Prayer Chain consists today of about 43 members (not all St. Paul members) whom I will email as needed with requests for prayers for our own members, for family and friends of members, and for any other issues in the world that are helped by prayer. We are also working very hard to locate members we have lost track of. The pandemic stopped worship in our sanctuary for several months, changed the way we distributed communion, and caused some members to attend remotely or not at all. Greetings from the Asset Management Board!

Did you know that St. Paul owns a house on our cemetery grounds in Baltimore at 1022 Joh Avenue? We have been renting the house out to tenants for the last several years - some years the Church made money on the rental, and other years, due to vacancy or required repairs, the Church has lost money. The Cemetery Committee has been considering the possibility of selling the house for the last year or two, but this month they engaged an architecture engineering company about how to proceed with rezoning and putting the property up for sale. This will undoubtedly be a long and involved process, but we will keep the congregation updated along the way.

At the church, a committee has been working for over a year on a plan to renovate the Sacristy, and we are getting close to putting that plan into action! We are also looking to use some available money from surplus funds to repair the Rose Window, which is leaking under certain conditions and incurring damage. We hope to have updates on both of these projects for you in the coming months.

ORPHAN GRAIN TRAIN-MARYLAND BRANCH



Relief for Human Need Worldwide

Orphan Grain Train (OGT) is an organization that collects, packs and ships needed humanitarian aid to people in areas hit by natural disaster, or that live in areas of extreme poverty. We ship both nationally and internationally. All funding comes from donations, all

the work is done by dedicated volunteers, and all shipped items are donated. The Maryland Branch was founded in 2006 and presently has a warehouse in Millersville. OGT is a Recognized Service Organization of the LCMS and has a four star Charity Navigator rating.

Since April of 2006, there have been 107 shipments, both domestic and international – the majority occurring since the 2016 building of the warehouse.

- International shipments: Cameroon, Cuba, Ghana, Haiti, Kyrgyzstan, India, Liberia, Moldova, Nicaragua, Philippines, Puerto Rico, South Sudan, Turkey, Ukraine and Uzbekistan.
- Domestic shipments have included: Afghan Resettlement in New Jersey, Baltimore Dream Center, Christian Appalachian Project, Helping Up Mission, Linda's legacy.
- Winter coats have been distributed through: Lutheran Church of Saint Andrew, Lutheran Church of the Redeemer, Martini Lutheran, Nazareth Lutheran, Our Savior Lutheran, St. Thomas Lutheran, St. Vincent de Paul Catholic Church, and Sharp Leadenhall Elementary School.

There is a free Walk-Out Program of used medical equipment that benefits the community. Such items include: hospital beds, walkers, rollators, canes, commodes and wheel chairs. People can come in or phone in and request the needed items.

During the early years of operation, OGT held 2 major mass packing events yearly, and the people of St. Paul frequently participated. Now people are invited to come to the Warehouse to sort- and - pack on Tuesdays from 9-12 noon, or 5-7 p.m. The 2^{nd} Saturday of each month is also a packing day. These are also times that donations are accepted. During November and early December, OGT is collecting coats and warm jackets. See attached flyer for more information. A list of items accepted for donations is also available in the narthex during November.

Orphan Grain Train-MD Branch is one of 27, located all over the country. The Grain Train movement shares personal and material resources with the needy and is "...a loving response to Jesus Christ's example as Servant and His love for us." (National website) Look for a St. Paul packing event and Warehouse visit this church year!
