The Season of Epiphany: Season of Mission

The season of Epiphany is sandwiched between the attention-grabbing seasons of Christmas and Lent. It can be easily overshadowed.

But paying attention during these weeks can pay dividends. The readings and the themes of Epiphany show us that God reveals himself for salvation, shines His light into a dark world and invites us to join Him in His mission to call people into His church. Each week at worship there is a mission theme, an invitation for us to shine, to invite others, to proclaim His mercies and presence. Take a look:

January 14th: Philip invites Nathaniel to "come and see" Jesus.

January 21st: Jesus tells us to follow Him and he will make us fishers of men.

January 28th: After He casts out an unclean spirit people everywhere are talking about Jesus.

February 4th: The mother-in-law of Peter responds to her healing with simple service to others.

February 11th: At the Transfiguration, Jesus shows his own divine light to the disciples. In the church he shares that same presence.

Epiphany is a time to consider how you can join Jesus' mission. How can you receive and shine that saving light? Speaking? Inviting? Simple service? Giving? Prayer? All of the above? Epiphany is the season to challenge yourself and let God lead you into mission service.

Kingdom Growth Ministries

Lutheran Mission Society – Compassion Place Ministries

For several months, we have learned about the Kingdom Growth ministries that St. Paul supports through our budgeted funds. One such ministry is the Lutheran Mission Society (LMS).



LMS was founded in 1905, with the mission of "... ministering to the needs of the body with food, clothing and shelter; ministering to the needs of the soul with the Good News of Jesus." (website) It was originally formed to assist immigrants coming through the Port of Baltimore, but the ministry has changed over the years to meet the changing and challenging needs of the people.

There is a network of 10 Compassion Centers, located throughout Maryland, with one in York, PA. These help those in need with food, clothing and personal care items, while sharing with them God's Word. Each Compassion Place Ministry site consists of:

<u>Compassion Center</u> - where clothing and food are offered free, along with spiritual care and prayer.

<u>Thrift Center</u> - clothes, housewares, toys, jewelry, collectibles, etc. can be purchased at bargain prices. The proceeds fund the Compassion Place ministries.

<u>Donation Center</u> - in-kind donations, new and gently used, are received. LMS is a 501(c)(3) charity and donations are tax deductible. They are also a Recognized Service Organization (RSO) of the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod.

Also part of the LMS ministry is the Compassionate Grace Counseling Center and a Housing Program.

There are many opportunities for service. Volunteers are needed to sort clothing, work in the Thrift Store, help with donation pick-ups, collect needed items, or assemble kits. At Christmas, there is the opportunity to adopt a needy family and provide gift and food baskets. You can also donate your unused vehicle to LMS.

A special service opportunity will happen this month. The school and church will be collecting items for health kits, which will be given out to the homeless. The school classes and church will be bringing in specific items for the kits. Please read the "Together We Make a Difference" article in the newsletter for more information and for items the congregation is asked to contribute.
