Of course, none of these things really express what this church is. There may be some truth in all of these but none really capture our life together.


This month on the 19th we will celebrate Pentecost, the festival of the Holy Spirit. Pentecost brings to mind for me two verbs that present what St. Paul is in her essence: gathering and sending. We might think of it of as centripetal and centrifugal forces that move our church life. The Holy Spirit moves us toward the center and also sends us out away.

That center is the Gospel and forgiveness and mercy of God accomplished by Christ. This center is sacramental and external: the Word which is preached and given in the Lord's Supper and Baptism. In these things we have certainty amid all the failures and burdens that follow us around. We are called to this center, out of our daily life to meet God in Christ.

But the Holy Spirit also sends us out to our calling and offices in life, our vocations. Family and civic life and employment and daily life aimed toward the needs of our neighbor. God has commanded this work to be done and has promised that when we do such things honestly and with love to the neighbor, we are pleasing to Him.

Yes, St. Paul is a Holy Spirit place: gathered and sent.

FROM THE CONGREGATIONAL PRESIDENT

In my last note, I said I was ready for spring. I forgot about allergies. I'm ready for pollen to disappear, but the temperatures are great and it's nice to get outside.

Security is something that the church and school had to address over the past couple of months. We have installed an alarm system in the building. It is not tied to the door code system. The alarm is set to arm itself and go off during certain times. If there is a meeting that is scheduled on the church calendar, the alarm will be set to arm after the meeting is over. If you have any plans to come into the church in the morning or evening and not for a scheduled meeting, please contact Steve Haar (steve.haar@splscatonsville.org) so the alarm can be disarmed and you don't have to panic. Additionally, we are going to minimize the number of physical keys we have. Over the summer we will be rekeying the church and asking members to use codes to open the red doors and the fellowship hall doors to access the building. The physical keys will be limited to select church leadership. If you need access to the building at any time, please contact Steve Haar so you can get a door code. Any questions on the alarms or the keys can be sent to me or Steve. Reminder that June 2nd is our next voters meeting. The biggest item to discuss will be the budget for next year. As with last year, we will be presenting a deficit budget. The budget we passed last year was large, but there are two things we do when we make these budgets. First, we are conservative with our giving numbers. We base our giving off current numbers with a slight increase. Second, we are liberal with our expenditure numbers. We plan for all the items we think we might need to spend on. Because of this, our current year spending and budget is looking a lot better than what we passed last year. Instead of an ~\$82K deficit, we will be closer to a \$20K deficit. The boards have been diligent and prudent in their spending, making sure we are being responsible with the gifts that God has given us. We look forward to discussing next year's budget. Please take time to review the documentation that will be provided in May.

The council and Capital Campaign committee met to discuss goal, priorities, and strategies. We continue to work on this so we can refine the goals of the Capital Campaign. At this time, we will be looking to begin the campaign in the Fall, but more likely the Spring. This is important and a goal of the council and church, but we want to make sure we are doing it right and for the right reasons.

KINGDOM GROWTH MINISTRY

FOOD FOR THE POOR (FFTP)

Each year a portion of our Kingdom Growth budget supports Food for the Poor. FFTP is an interdenominational Christian organization that provides food, medicine, housing, emergency relief, clean water and agricultural help to the poor in Latin America and the Caribbean. It is a 501(c) (3) charity, based in Coconut Creek, Florida, and our congregation has been supporting it for many years. When support first began, we chose to put our money towards the building of houses. Because of the greater expense (\$9,800) congregations are encouraged to collect half the amount (\$4,900) and then 2 congregations are paired to fund the 2 bedroom house. Since our support began on 2008, we have helped build 6 houses in Haiti. Founded in 1982, FFTP has built over 88,000 homes for the needy in its 40 plus years of existence. The Mission Statement states that FFTP seeks to link churches of the First World with churches of the Developing World. Their Vision is shaped by the "...belief that Christ is alive and can be served directly by serving those in greatest need." Since 2008, we have helped serve the Lord in this way


