


INTERNATIONAL MISSIONARY SERVICE WITH THE LCMS?

Learning Cottage Update

We are still making progress on the Learning Cottage, but it is going slower than we would like. Recently we had a new concrete pad poured so that we can move the existing dumpster away from the Learning Cottage's eventual home. We also had a civil engineer come to inspect the site where the Learning Cottage will live and gave us positive feedback; we are hoping to have a site plan in place very soon.

We will continue to provide progress updates on the Learning Cottage via the newsletter.

Cemetery House Sale

Like the Learning Cottage, the sale of the Cemetery House is taking longer than expected due to complex state regulations and paperwork concerning deeds and property designations. The Cemetery House Sale Committee is doing everything possible to keep the process moving forward.

Other Updates

We recently had to purchase a new freezer for the kitchen, as the old freezer was failing and repairing it would not have been cost effective. Thanks to the Women's Guild and an anonymous member of the congregation for helping to cover some of that cost.

We've also been making some roof repairs, primarily around the bell tower near where T-Mobile's equipment is installed. T-Mobile has covered the repairs in that area.

Finally, we are working on making some upgrades to our video surveillance system and discussing an improved camera at the Fellowship Hall door as well as a new keypad and camera for the fire escape door. Much of this work will be covered by various grants.


Our elementary and ECC are working together in various ways:

COAT COLLECTION: November 1 – December 15

Orphan Grain Train will again be collecting winter coats and jackets. The garments will be given to several inner-city Lutheran churches to distribute to their surrounding communities. They will also be distributed through local relief organizations. We have need of new or gently used winter coats/jackets for men, women and children - but this year especially, for children.

Coats and jackets can be brought to St. Paul any Sunday morning from 9 – 11:30 a.m. starting November 9 and continuing until December 14. The Giguere COATMOBILE (i.e. red pickup truck) will be in the parking lot. Bag your coats and put them in the bed of the truck. You may also place other items for OGT (bedding, clothing, fabric, medical equipment, shoes, soft toys, children's books, etc.) in the truck. If you desire, coats can also be brought to the OGT Warehouse, 621 East West Blvd, Millersville on Tuesdays, 9- 12 noon, 5 – 7 pm.
