EASTER WATER

Did you know that around the world Easter is associated with strange folk customs involving water?

- Dyngus Day is a Polish Easter tradition celebrated on the Monday after Easter, (also known as “Wet Monday”) where people playfully douse each other with water. Its more modern variants involve water guns, balloons, and buckets.
- “Jutrowna Woda” is a Wendish custom, where young women go to a creek in complete silence before sunrise on Easter to collect water. The water must be collected in silence on the way and on the way back. The “Easter water” was then sprinkled on family to wake them up to a joyful Easter. (Wends are Slavic group from Germany and Poland and now the US).
- There is a similar tradition in parts of Maine where residents rise early on Easter to gather “l’eau de Paques,” or “Easter water.” It’s a Catholic tradition brought over from France and was thought to have healing and restorative powers.
- On the Greek island of Corfu, water is thrown out the window onto streets to welcome spring and new crops.
- In some parts of Germany water poured on a boy on Easter was thought to hasten a wedding proposal. It was also used to protect against skin and eye problems if one washed with the water on Easter Day.

So why go on about weird Easter water customs? First, because it is fun and educational! But more importantly because it points us to a great truth about our celebration of the resurrection of Jesus. It is baptismal celebration. It is a water thing.

Baptism is an Easter thing, and Easter is a baptism thing. In baptism we die to sin and we rise with Christ (Romans 6). As Jesus went down into the grave and came up new and alive, we go down in our baptism and come up alive and forgiven as new people. As the Israelites went down into the Red Sea and marched forward with the Egyptians dead on the shore, our enemies of sin and death are put away in the water. Each day we live our Baptism by putting sin behind us and living a new “baptized” life.

Of course, these traditions above of water with healing and restoring powers are superstitions. They aren’t true. But they are memories, echoes of a great and profound truth. Baptism, which is connected to Christ’s resurrection, does cleanse us from all sin and makes us clean and holy.

So don’t go throwing water on people this Easter but throw water on yourself — baptismal water. Water that has Christ’s word and promise attached, water that “works forgiveness of sins, rescues from death and the devil, and gives eternal salvation”.

The Elders sub-committee on Adult Education met on March 17, 2026, to discuss the educational offerings at St. Paul. We are pleased at the variety of classes and Bible studies available. St. Paul, of course, has the 8:45 AM Sunday morning class that meets before the 10 AM church service. We have managed to have different instructors presenting on various topics so that our Pastor can enjoy being a participant in addition to being a presenter. Pastor will be offering 5 classes (April 19-May 17) on Religious Organizations and Movements (known at ROM); you will see the survey sheet he has with all the many choices listed so you can select the top five as topics for his classes. St. Paul also has my bi-monthly Thursday morning (10-11 AM) discussion class on the Gospel of John in the sacristy, Lutheran Books and Beer at the Rathskeller the fourth Thursday of each month, and our Vicar's Young Adult Bible class offered on the second and fourth Saturday and his Youth Group (open to Confirmation and Confirmation-age students as well as high schoolers) that meets at 7:00 p.m. on the fourth Friday of the month featuring Bible Study and games. Summer Sunday classes will begin May 31 and run through August 30. As happened last summer, various presenters will be offering classes then, typically one Sunday per presenter. A particularly favorite topic is exploring the lessons of that given Sunday. We give thanks that we have so many people willing to teach, fifteen by our count.

Easter Is Coming

Easter is coming this year on Sunday, April 5th. Christmas and Easter comprise two moments in the church year when people will think of going to church; some show up as visitors at St. Paul. As Easter approaches, let us be friendly and reach out to those who visit St. Paul so that they might be moved to become members with us as opposed to being a visitor. Last year, St. Paul communed close to 150 people on Easter Day.

join our sisters and brothers at Emmanuel in welcoming the Risen Lord in our midst!

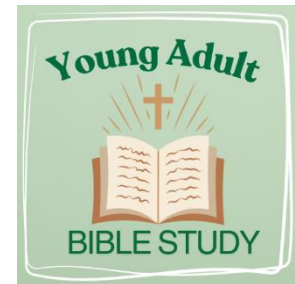

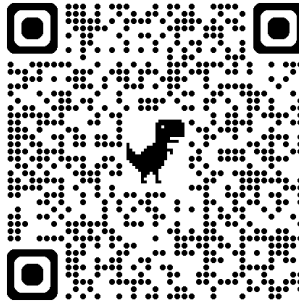
